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Message from the Chief

Boozhoo, All my Relations,

I hope everyone is well. Preparations for this year's Gathering are well under way; many have already registered. As mentioned in past editions of the Bear Fax, this year's Gathering's business agenda will focus on Community Visioning and strategic direction as well as the development of basic land use policies.

Four days certainly doesn't seem like enough time to dedicate to the work we need to do, however, it does provide for an excellent start. I hope those of you attending will participate in the working sessions in order to ensure your input into the development of our community's Vision and strategic direction as well as land use policies. Upon your arrival to the camp, we are planning to poll as many of you as possible to ensure your input into the development of our business agenda.

Mid week, on Wednesday, August 17, we are going to focus on celebration and commemoration. We will be celebrating our strength, courage, patience, perseverance and survival; as well as commemorating the signing of the Land Transfer Legal Agreement this past January, with a ceremonial signing of the agreement and the feasting of our accomplishments as a community. We have sent invitations out to government officials as well as many First Nations dignitaries and business associates to come and help us celebrate this significant time of our history.

We are still faced with challenges moving forward. The Union of Ontario Indians (UOI) as well as Chief Joe Buckell of Michipicoten First Nation continue to challenge the province on the transfer of lands to Missanabie Cree. The UOI is contending we are outside of Treaty #9 boundaries and are impacting the treaty rights of the Michipicoten First Nation. Chief Buckell has been so bold as to advise mining and mining exploration companies we have no treaty rights or interests within the region and are not required to consult us.

We understand our connections to Wabatongushi, Dog lake and the Big Missinaibi watersheds; to communities like Lochalsh and Missanabie and surrounding areas. We also understand the kinships with the many surrounding communities, Brunswick House, Chapleau Cree, White River, as well as Michipicoten, tied to each of these places by water and blood. We also acknowledge a shared interest in the region. We may not have treaty rights in the region, but I firmly believe we continue to hold our constitutionally protected aboriginal rights as we never negotiated to give up our interests within this region.

I don't believe the land transfer is threatened; however the province has been in contact with us suggesting we remove the set-aside status of lands which fall within the Robinson Superior treaty area. The province is suggesting lands within the Treaty #9 area are available, that they have had inter ministerial discussions and will provide us with some options in the next while.

The Multi-purpose Facility, Keekanaw is nearing completion. We are hopeful that we will be able to open the building during our day of celebrations. Once it is completed, I am proposing we relocate our administration as soon as possible, using the facilities at Island View camp over the winter if necessary to ensure the province and others understand that we are serious about our intention to reestablish our community within our traditional home lands.

I hope everyone has a safe journey up to Missanabie, and I look forward to seeing you there...

Sacred Items



When we carry sacred items we carry them for the people and they do not belong to us essentially but remain in our care until they are passed on and/or their work is complete. Eagle Feathers, Eagle Staffs, Prayer Pipes, Drums, Drum Sticks, Sweat Shakers, Medicine Rattles, Medicine Bundles, Eagle Whistles and any type of Sacred object are to be cared for like a living being; they are Manidoo (Spirit).

Feasts are put on for these items seasonal or annually to feed their spirit for the work they are doing for the people and for the person that is carrying them.

When we carry sacred items, we carry them with the understanding in our hearts that everything amongst Original Family (Creation) has a Manidoo (Spirit). The animals, birds, fish, plants, Grandfather and Grandmother Rocks, Grandmother Moon, Grandfather Sun, the Stars, acknowledging the elements (Air, Fire, Earth and Water). All of these very important things are always acknowledged when we pray with our Sacred Items and their connection to our Original Family.

When we start that Sacred Fire or begin that ceremony we pay respect to the Four Directions and those Sacred Items that help us in our lives. We call on those Sacred Items for guidance and

direction in our lives; guidance for the leadership in our communities. As people of earth we seek guidance from the Manidoo for balance.

It is important to be clear as to what these Sacred Items mean and their purpose for our people. They are to be respected, cared for, prayed with, talked to, feasted or fed, treated like the living beings they are.

When handling Sacred Items it is said that your body and mind must be clean; clean of any substances. Alcohol or drugs have no place around Sacred Items just as Alcohol or Drugs have no place around Ceremony.

At the Annual Missanabie Cree Gathering, we are in ceremony as soon as we post the Eagle Staff and light that Sacred Fire. We are calling the Manidoo to help us in our thinking and vision for the people. We are trying to move forward on this good path with a clear vision for the Missanabie Cree First Nation and the consumption or abuse of substances has no place in that ceremony.

We carry these traditions close to our hearts for the next seven generations and for the generations that have passed who gave up their lives to ensure we have this good way of life. These Sacred Items are here to help us on our life journey and we must ensure that they are taken care of.

We have been busy for this month, attending the Gordon-Cosens Forestry Management plan in Hearst doing an assessment regarding the implications upon our traditional lands. Also, attended the Land Use Planning conference in Timmins addressing issues regarding our relationship to the regional First Nations in our inherent land designations. I continue to stay active within my designated portfolio and am looking forward to seeing you all at our upcoming Gathering.

I will be doing GIS work at the end of July in Timmins and I will also be doing some clearing at the Base of Manitou Mountain for ceremonies. This will be reported on in the next report. Just for some background though, Geo-

graphic Information Systems, or GIS, is a very useful and important tool in land use planning. It uses aerial photography to show land parcels, topography, physical features, and other pertinent information. GIS systems contain layers of graphic information and their relational databases that may be projected into maps that allow the user to view a composite of a specific area, adding an array of graphically-oriented decision making tools to the planning process.



- To develop a consultation and communications strategy to ensure informed decision-making capacity of the membership.


